Foreword

“YOU are entitled to rejoice. The people of this country and the people of the Dominions, and of our Allies, have won such a victory for freedom as the world has never seen. You have all had a share in it. Sons and daughters of the people have done it, and this is their hour of rejoicing.” So the Prime Minister of England spoke to the people of London on the morning of November 11, 1918, the happiest morning in the history of Britain. The months that have passed have not effaced our memories of the joy that blazed up in the Dominion on that day, nor, although we have been living in peace during these months, will there be any reserves in our rejoicing over the formal confirmation of the victory of November.

New Zealand is entitled to rejoice, not as a neutral relieved from the embarrassments of war, but as a State which took its full part in the achievement of victory, as a nation whose sons need no longer go forth to death for the establishment of peace and freedom for our children. The peace we celebrate is not peace established merely through a return to the world-conditions that existed in 1914—conditions that exposed the world to the constant danger of war. It is peace based on the ruin of autocracies and the creation in their place of a system of real national responsibilities.

The statistics of New Zealand's effort in the provision of fighting men are such as this country may well be proud of. The number of men actually mobilised in camp for service in the Expeditionary Force overseas was 124,211, or one-ninth of the total population, one-half of the men of military age. Of these, 100,444 men were actually sent abroad on active service—an army more than three times as great as that which fought at Waterloo. Practically the whole of the population of military age was put through the recruiting machine—220,089 out of 243,376. From the beginning of the war until the end the Dominion maintained its supply of men, and there were actually in the field 24,000 men on the morning on which the Armistice was signed.

These are the men who performed New Zealand's part in winning the war. Most of them, happily, are with us or are returning home, but thousands of them will never return. On the peninsula of Gallipoli, the hills and plains of Palestine, the fields of France, and the flat lands of Flanders, there are New Zealand graves. New Zealanders lie buried in many a country in Europe and Asia. Our share in the victory cost us the lives of 16,386 men, and in the rejoicings of these days, and in all the days to come, New Zealand will remember these gallant dead.

While the men were fighting overseas, the spirit of service was strong here at home. The millions in money and goods which were given to the many War Funds did not make up the whole of the home service; to them must be added the devoted labour of innumerable public-spirited men and women. Their labours are now rewarded, and rewarded, above all, are the sacrifices of those who have suffered and died for us, those through whose fidelity to the common cause New Zealand has secured her title to rejoice over the signing of the peace.

We acknowledge, O Lord, that Thou art a great King over all the earth, and that only by Thy power can the kingdoms of the earth be established, and that the power and greatness of our nation are the gifts of Thy gracious hand. We pray that by Thy grace we may accept them as a sacred trust, and may use them so that truth and righteousness and love may increase and abound in our nation and through all the earth. We beseech Thee in Thy great goodness grant that the conflicts through which Thou hast brought us may be a purging fire cleansing the life of our nation, that we may be truly penitent for our manifold sins, and that we may henceforth yield ourselves to Thee in true obedience to Thy commandments. We earnestly pray that the spirit of brotherhood and good will may prevail among us and all the peoples of the earth and that we may always live in prosperity to the honour and glory of Thy great name. We beseech Thee evermore to continue Thy mercy toward us, that all the world may know Thou art our Saviour and mighty Deliverer, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
